

# 2000 NATIONAL TOURNAMENT A SUNSHINE SUCCESS

West Virginia, North Carolina, Georgia, Florida, and Louisiana did brain battle in the academic areas of Mathematics (EQUATIONS and ON-SETS), Social Studies (PRESIDENTS and WORLD EVENTS), and Language Arts (LINGUISHTIK and PROPAGANDA) for four days. Most groups visited the area attractions either before or after the tournament.

The Elementary Division (grades 4 - 6) was again the largest, with relatively small bodies, but huge minds and hearts. The Middle Division (6 - 8) was perhaps the fiercest competition, with champions emerging from various parts of the nation. In the Junior (9-10) and Senior Divisions (11-12), veteran players challenged each other to perform at their peaks, with victors crowned but the vanquished praised. Respect and cooperation were displayed everywhere.

## BEST ACADEMIC GAMERS OF THE 20TH CENTURY

Over 100,000 students played in Academic Games tournaments in the 20th Century, beginning with the first interschool play in 1966. (From 1966 through 1991, tournament play was conducted under the auspices of The National Academic Games Project.) Approximately 6,000 of those students made it through local and regional qualifying to compete at one or more of the 34 National Championships of the 20th Century. The Academic Games Leagues of America (AGLOA) Board selected the top 50 Individuals, 9 Teams, and 15 Coaches as the Best Academic Gamers of the 20th Century.

A separate AGLOA publication honoring these "Best of the 20th Century" Academic Gamers lists their accomplishments, with anecdotes, feature articles, and some pictures.

#### This Stuff DOES Make a Difference!

At the 2000 National Tournament, AGLOA honored the outstanding players, coaches, and teams of the 20th Century. The records of these individuals are testimony enough to their excellence. But, what difference does it make in human terms? How does all of this Academic Games "stuff" affect people's lives? Why would you ever want to be involved in Academic Games? Do the participants get anything out of being stretched and challenged to be their best? Some of the stars talked with an AGLOA interviewer at the 2000 National Tournament and revealed some of what makes them continue to tick the Academic Games clock.

#### Ava Sue Hickerson: Elementary School teacher and coach

My favorite game is PROPAGANDA, because it's real life. You see the techniques being used all the time. Once you teach kids to recognize propaganda, they point it out to you all the time. They point it out to their parents, too. PROPAGANDA's just real life.

#### Cedric Small: High School teacher and coach and former champion player

I remember as a player we would practice on Monday nights and Saturday mornings. It never was a chore. It was like a party. That's one of the things I'm so grateful for, because instead of associating with the crowd who was drinking and hanging out late at night and being in the wrong places, I was hanging out with the "nerds" up in the old main building studying math, and loving it.

Even though I am a math teacher, I learn so much about history through PRESIDENTS every year. From the first time I picked up a PRESIDENTS book in seventh grade, I continue to be fascinated. I continue to learn.

In comparing the grammar I've learned in LINGUISHTIK to the grammar I learned at the University of Michigan, LINGUISHTIK is way up there. When I show people I know grammar, they assume it is because I am an English teacher, but it is really because I learned it to play LINGUISHTIK. I'm grateful for that.

I love Academic Games because it fosters such an enthusiasm about learning.

#### Paula Hidalgo: Former coach and District coordinator for Academic Games

These are the hardest working people I have ever seen. They give their souls. They volunteer. I just wish there was some way that everyone in the world could come meet these outstanding teachers and coaches. It's not easy, but they love it.

#### David Lagattuta: Senior High School player

I had been playing for a few years and had done all right, but nothing spectacular. Then, I came down and looked at the scores. I saw my name at the very top of the list. Its was great. It was fantastic. I will always remember that moment.

#### Rod Beard: Businessman, Assistant Coach and former champion player

Academic Games has taught me the value of teamwork, hard work, and dedication. Through Academic Games, I have strengthened my self-confidence and ability to lead groups. In all, Academic Games has been the most valuable experience in my life.

#### Sue Mellon: Secondary Coach and District coordinator and former player

I just think of all the kids who wouldn't really have a place in their school. Maybe they're too shy. They are bright kids, but they are not aggressive. Academic Games has been a way for them to come out of that shell. It's a place for these kids, where they can slowly fit in and excel and learn to be competitive. A lot of kids learn competitiveness and self-esteem through sports. For these kids, it is Academic Games.

#### Nancy Kinard: High School teacher and coach

One of my former players stayed in school his senior year primarily because of Academic Games. He's now a very successful RETIRED businessman in Tampa. He sold his business at a multi-million dollar price. He's what -- twenty eight or nine? He credits Academic Games as a major influence in his success.

#### Mary Jo Petterson: High School teacher and coach of many championship teams

The kids over the years have just been wonderful. I know one of the things is that you get to meet some incredible kids that you would not otherwise get to teach in the classroom. It gives you a sense of pride and accomplishment as a teacher to see how these kids come in, work so hard, and achieve. It's affected my life just in getting to know these terrific people.

#### Marci Kelsey: Technology Businesswoman and former champion player

I can't believe that was 15 years ago -- it seems like yesterday. I have such fond memories of the whole experience! I hope it's around for my kids someday.

#### Chad Hood: Physician and former champion player

Academic Games had a major impact on my life. The challenges..., the contacts... I remember riding home on those long bus trips and crying because the event was over. I felt that way every year and I still feel that way 15 years later.

The AGLOA Board is proud of all that has been accomplished and prouder still of the effects that are yet to come as a result of the Academic Games experience.

#### AVA SUE GETS A NEW PAIR OF SHOES

The Grande Dame -- the Leader of the Little Ones -- the Matriarch of the Muppets -- the Elementary Excellency -- Her Highness Ava Sue Hickerson was "roasted" by her friends and colleagues in a retirement reception at the 2000 Academic Games National Tournament in Kissimmee. She will walk around the world on many trips instead of walking down the Elementary School halls as a teacher.

Ava Sue has been the Coordinator of the Elementary Division at the National Tournament for the past 14 years. She has been active in local, Regional, and National Academic Games competitions since 1978. Ava Sue can be characterized by quality photography (especially of flowers), little colored cards (for scheduling), big display posters (more scheduling), master organization (she cares about the younger kids), unending energy (6 AM to midnight), superb management of people (judges and coaches love her), a caring touch with the students (kids love her, too), and quality and excellence in everything she does. As an added bonus, Ava Sue does it all with a smile and a contagious giggle.

Though most Academic Gamers know Ava Sue as the National Elementary Division organizational director, her most important role was as local school teacher and Academic Games coach. Her players regularly formed the nucleus of Palm Beach County, Florida, All-Star teams. She had the heart of a champion wrapped in the compassion of a loving Mom. It was fitting that some of her players and teams won 2000 National Championships in her final year as coach.

Ava Sue Hickerson is an Academic Games legend. Her selection as one of the 20th Century's best Elementary coaches is well-deserved. She exemplifies all that is good about the teachers and coaches involved in Academic Games. She is a wonderful model to follow.

## 2001 NATIONAL TOURNAMENT WII BE IN BATON ROUGE, LOUISIANA

The 2001 Academic Games National Tournament will take place April 28 - 30, in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Players and coaches will arrive on April 27 for registration. Awards ceremonies will be conducted in the evening of April 30. Over 1,000 participants are expected.

Students, coaches, and parents will be housed and will play in two different hotels within a few blocks of one another. High School Divisions will stay and play in The Baton Rouge Hilton. Elementary and Middle Divisions will stay and play in the Radisson Hotel and Conference Center.

Several activities are being planned by the AGLOA Board. Nearby New Orleans may be visited by groups before and after the Tournament. Full registration information will be mailed to existing league coordinators and other interested parties in early December 2000. ### YEAR 2000 OUTSTANDING SENIORS


