

2002 ACADEMIC GAMES NATIONALS Race to Charlotte, NC

Nearly 1,000 Academic Games players, coaches, and parents raced to Charlotte, North Carolina, April 25–29, 2002, to challenge each other at the Academic Games National Tournament. Players flocked by plane, bus, and car from Michigan, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Georgia, Louisiana, Florida, and host North Carolina to enjoy a wonderful four-day experience. Veteran teams and players welcomed newcomers and battled them for national team and individual championships.

Competition was held in the traditional four Divisions of Elementary (4–6), Middle (7–8), Junior (9–10), and Senior (11–12) in three different academic areas—Mathematics (EQUATIONS and ON-SETS), Language Arts (LINGUISHTIK and PROPAGANDA), and Social Studies (WORLD EVENTS and PRESIDENTS). A few players competed in all six games tournaments. Most focused on four of the tournaments in order to qualify for the sweepstakes championship as well as their own particular area of expertise.

The opening welcome ceremony featured a mock stock car race with volunteers from the teacher and parent delegations testing each other as they weaved around and through the audience enroute to a stirring finish. The crowd went wild. Almost all participants later took a break from their head-to-head matches to enjoy the Carowinds Amusement Park on Saturday night. On that night, the races were in roller coasters.

As always, the academic games matches stretched the minds and hearts of the players. Most learned new mathematics strategies or were enlightened about new techniques of propaganda or developed a deeper appreciation for our national leaders or displayed a thorough knowledge of U.S. exploration of space. All players learned more about themselves emotionally.

Old friendships were renewed; new friendships were formed. Foes were vanquished; then winners and losers embraced. The 2002 Academic Games National Tournament, hosted by a most hospitable Mecklenburg Area Catholic Schools contingent, afforded a rewarding and enjoyable time for everyone.

Testing Proof

AGLOA is planning control group studies to show that students involved in Academic Games perform better in school and on standardized tests than comparable students who do not play Academic Games. All of us suspect that this is true. Carefully structured studies by independent consultants will show whether our beliefs are in line with the truth. Results of the studies will be used in marketing efforts for AGLOA expansion.

PRESIDENTS/PROPAGANDA Starter Packet

Individual teachers often contact AGLOA asking how they can get started with Academic Games. Of course, it is impossible to have an Academic Games League with one school. However, it is possible to have in-school matches with PRESIDENTS and PROPAGANDA questions, the results of which CAN be compared to others. AGLOA's efforts in this regard will include a video of how to play PRESIDENTS and PROPAGANDA, plus a CD or diskette of PRESIDENTS and PROPAGANDA question rounds that can be used for in-school competitions. Using these materials, new schools can begin Academic Games competitions and later learn the cube games when formal workshops can be organized.


Summer Camps

AGLOA will be working with several school districts over the next few years to prepare materials and outline effective Academic Games summer camps. The intended outcomes of the summer camps will be student progress and coaching improvements. Summer camps will be used as jump-starters for new programs as well as catalysts for improving existing Leagues.

2003 NATIONAL TOURNAMENT TO BE HELD IN WHEELING, WEST VIRGINIA

The 2003 Academic Games National Tournament will be held May 2–5, 2003, at the Oglebay Resort in Wheeling, West Virginia, about 90 minutes west of Pittsburgh, PA. Groups will arrive on Friday, May 2, for registration and the opening ceremony. Competition will take place May 3–5, with awards on the evening of May 5. Nearly 1,000 participants are expected at the beautiful Oglebay site.

The Cream of the 70's Rises to the Top

For the second straight year, the High School Division players were thrilled by the appearance of a 1970's Academic Games star. In 2001, it was Vic Chandhok, one of the top ten winningest Academic Gamers of the 20th Century. In Charlotte, for 2002, the visiting former champion was Paul Fletcher, a top 20 winner in his own right, and a co-captain of the famous Pine Crest, Florida, team of the 1970's.

Mr. Fletcher has a claim on 21 different team and individual national championships during his six-year Academic Games career from 1970–75. His Pine Crest team has the distinction of being the only Senior Division team to win three straight National Sweepstakes titles, since Senior Division was 10–12 at that time. Though Mr. Fletcher's expertise was in Social Studies and Language Arts, he and his teammates were skilled enough in Mathematics to win the Junior Division EQUATIONS National crown when they were in ninth grade.

Mr. Fletcher regaled the Junior and Senior Division players with stories of his past experiences in Academic Games. He shared with them how the character he developed in the Academic Games competitions served him well during his law career. And he was the guest reader for PROPAGANDA and PRESIDENTS, the two games in which he won his first two individual championships exactly thirty years ago in 1972. A fond memory! As Paul wrote to us over a year ago,... "I've had a smile on my face the whole time I was tapping out this story about Academic Games."

Mr. Fletcher is currently the Editor-in-Chief of the Virginia Lawyers Weekly in Richmond, Virginia. His wife and two children also made the trip to Charlotte with him to verify that their husband and Dad really was as good as he always told them he was. The whole family enjoyed the weekend. And the current Academic Games community thoroughly enjoyed Paul Fletcher.




