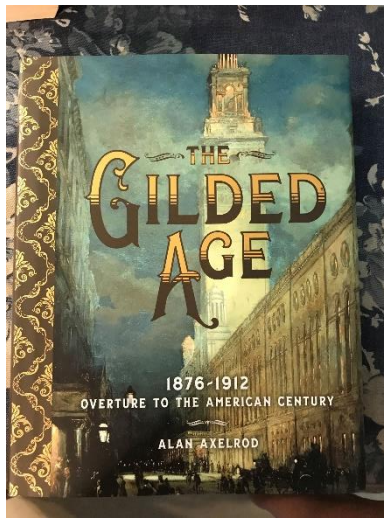


# *The Gilded Age*

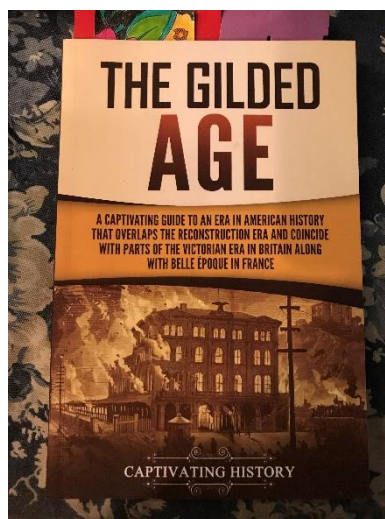
## Coaching Tips 2021-22

Here are the resources that were used to create the outline for the Gilded Age:

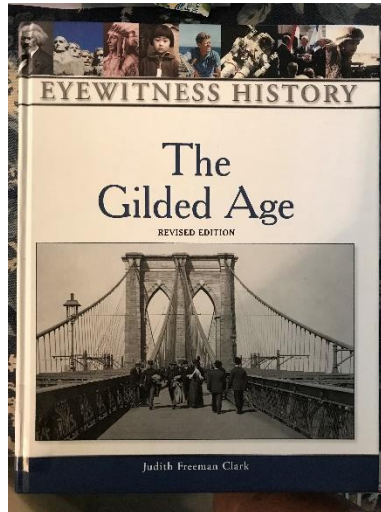
This first book about the Gilded Age is an easy read with many details you don't find in traditional history books. It's a good place to start your research. High school students could read this book on their own.



This book is a short intro to the Gilded Age. It just gives an overview with no real details. On page 36, it does give a great explanation of the word “gilded” and why this time in our history is called the “Gilded Age.”



This last book will probably be the one students use the most. It is setup by years and gives an overview of events and a timeline. Each chapter finishes with excerpts from personal correspondence from people in the Gilded Age. The excerpts of personal correspondence were added to the revised addition (2006 copyright date). There are also maps and charts illustrating various events.



## Beyond Books
